- A **framework**, with required (core) and optional (advanced) actions that defines responsible water stewardship
- Applicable at the **site-level** and requires **engagement in the catchment**
- Applicable to **all sectors** in all **geographies**

- Built through a 4-year **multi-stakeholder** process and represents the interests of the public sector, private sector and civil society
- Supported with a **verification** system that will allow sites and companies to issue credible claims
- 6 steps, **29 core criteria** (required), 29 advanced criteria (with points)
- Supported by comprehensive guidance that explicitly **links the Standard to the various water tools**
- **Aligns** with the European Water Stewardship standard

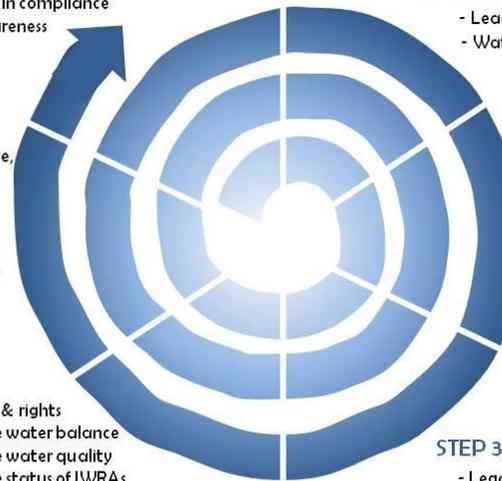

The AWS Standard is based on a process of continual improvement allowing users to begin their journey wherever they are, and adaptively manage water at the site, and engage stakeholders beyond their site to address their shared water challenges. 29 core criteria are supplemented with an additional 29 advanced-level criteria to encourage sites to strive even higher.

water areas of critical importance to species and communities.

The AWS Standard, which is intended to be applied at the site level, in any sector, anywhere on the planet, is supported with a verification system allowing implementers to provide evidence of responsible water stewardship to interested parties.

Using a governance structure that balances interests, AWS will continue to maintain the Standard's integrity. AWS also works with regional partners to ensure its system works in coordination with others, as well as integrates with other water stewardship tools.
